

Meet the Governor – Colin Hartley

Governors have an important role in ensuring that Mossgate is constantly seeking to improve by working with myself and staff to provide the best education we possibly can. They have **three core functions**:

1. Planning the strategic direction of the school.
2. Overseeing financial performance of the school and ensuring money is well spent.
3. Holding the headteacher and senior leaders to account.

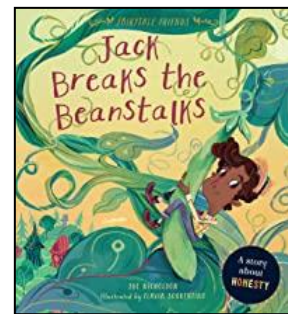
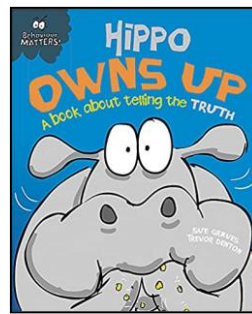
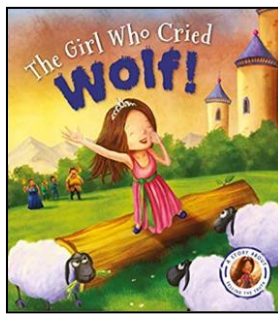
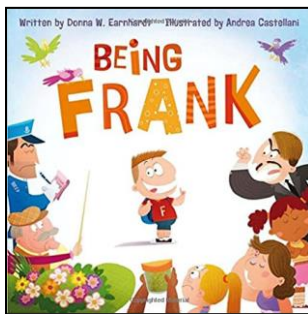
People who show honesty realise:

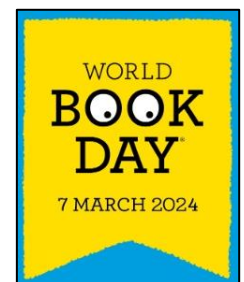
Curriculum Newsletters

World Book Day 2024

This World Book Day, we will once again be prioritising books and reading. (Children will have the opportunity to dress up on Friday 15th March for our non-uniform day.) On Thursday 7th March, we are inviting children to bring in their favourite book to school which is wrapped to keep the book a mystery! (The book could be from home, the school library or the local library.) On the front of the wrapping, which doesn't have to be anything elaborate and you can use newspaper or brown paper from an Amazon delivery, we would like you to write three exciting words which describes the book to make it as appealing as possible to others. During the day, children will spend time sharing their book with their classmates, reading their favourite extract and discussing what they like about their book. Each class will then decide which book they would like their class teacher to read to them.



Home Reading Reminders

Home reading is essential for children to develop their vocabulary and reading fluency so they can access the full curriculum and learn. Please read daily for at least 20 minutes, regardless of age, with your child so you can support.

Junior children (and some Y2) will be expected to read at least one book and score 80%+ in their reading quiz every week – this is **monitored every Thursday**.

In the **infants**, staff monitor home reading every Friday and will contact parents if they are concerned. Reading records are **monitored every Friday**.

Pupil Voice: Health, Behaviour and Safety

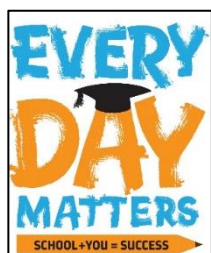
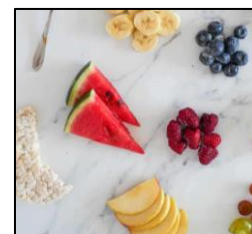

Healthy Playtime Snacks and Allergies

Mossgate is part of the National Fruit for Schools scheme which means that all children in Reception Elm, Y1 Maple and Y2 Willow are offered a free piece of fruit for their morning break. (If we have extra fruit, this is also offered to the juniors at playtimes.) Fruit varies weekly, and across the seasons, and typically includes: bananas, carrots, pears, apples, raisins and satsumas. All children can bring in their own fruit from home if they wish. Please do not send in unhealthy snacks like cereal bars, crisps and biscuits for playtime snacks. (Please note that these can still be included in your child's packed lunch as part of a balanced packed lunch.)

I have previously shared that we have a Y1 child with a severe peanut and egg allergy who has suffered from anaphylaxis and has an Epi-Pen autoinjector in school. Once again, I am asking that all families, do their part to keep him safe in school. Please can you refrain from including foods as playtime snacks and / or packed lunches which contain nuts or eggs, for example, loose nuts, peanut butter sandwiches, egg mayonnaise etc. Thank you for your understanding and support.



Attendance & Punctuality Matters

Regular and punctual attendance is vital for children's learning. The vast majority of children at Mossgate have great attendance with some days missed due to serious illness or medical needs. When attendance falls below 97%, this will be monitored closely. Attendance below 96% may result in medical evidence being required before absences are authorised, home visits and attendance plans.
